FROM THE PRESIDENT

With many prayers for God's blessing, we have embarked on the 2021-2022 school year at MLC!

The greatest joy so far has been just seeing our entire campus family together in Chapel of the Christ for the opening service. It had been sixteen months (March 2020) since our campus family last had the opportunity to all be together for worship.



While we are down about 7% compared to last year's opening enrollment, we remain thankful for all those whom the Lord has brought to campus. I am looking forward to meeting individually with each first-year student (and transfer student). One of my favorite things to ask is this: "What got you thinking about pursuing the ministry?" The answers are many and varied, but it is always interesting to see in what ways God has been at work in their lives to get them to be willing to consider ministry as their life's vocation.

And that is where you enter the picture! Again and again last year, as I made about 190 visits, I heard stories of parents, grandparents, teachers, staff ministers, pastors, and members of congregations speaking words of encouragement about studying for public ministry—sometimes almost in passing—that those students remembered years later.

As much as I thank God for our admissions counselors at MLC, our front-line admissions counselors are those of you reading this report. It is you who plant the idea of ministry in the minds and hearts of our future students. Your conversations with the young men and women (and the not-so-young considering a second career) in your families and church families, in your classrooms and on your athletic teams, are bearing fruit years later as these same young people arrive at MLC's new-student orientation.

Training the next generation of staff ministers, teachers, and pastors—filling the vacancies we hear about so often and being prepared for the new harvest fields yet to be pursued—takes the prayers and words and efforts of all of us. Such is the importance of having a well-trained corps of Christian witnesses for our churches and schools and for mission fields across our country and around the world.

How will you partner with us this year? We thank God for you in advance. And we trust God will use those efforts in ways far beyond what we will know until heaven!
