minimum of 16 workers and staff on our campus on all times, our school is a constant buzz of activity. Outside of our Sunday morning worship, it is also our main ministry focus as a congregation. As we welcome a new principal and teacher - after welcoming 3 new teachers last summer - an important area of focus will be on developing the connect between our church members and school families. This is an area of largely untapped potential, and the success that we've seen has been mostly organic. Our school has grown to mirror our community more and more in recent years. What a blessing it could be if our church fully capitalized on the Great Commission work that is right before us in the diverse Des Moines community!

• Outreach plan

- a. We would invite new people for Thanksgiving Day dinner and do some outdoor picnic with service in the summer.
- b. Currently, we are offering After School, and ESL/Adults Classes. In these language courses, we teach them about the Bible, not only languages.
- c. We plan to open an official website for outreach. For now we are using a Facebook page to reach out into the community.
- d. We post outreach ads on Korean Christian Newspaper, weekly.
- e. We make handy flyers and pass out these to people at front of Korean Market in the local area.
- f. Visit the Community college around our area for outreach.
- g. Online bible study through virtual class solution to children who around evangelist in Korea

• K School and Afterschool to Help Pubic School Kids

Many children immigrate to this country and are immediately at a disadvantage because of language barriers. When they go to public schools, their ability to learn is severely restricted because of this. One of K School's goals is to provide for those children and offer classes with bilingual teachers. Children can learn at a good pace and also become more comfortable learning English and any other subjects because of frequent interactions with their teachers and peers to whom they can relate.

This project would like to give them the opportunity to learn and grow up to become not only great Christians, but a bridge to Holy Trinity Church & School as well. K School will provide basically a home schooling environment with virtual online classes for any

children. The online classes will also be provided, as well as classes during the break. Lastly, from this program, we believe that children should become great gospel distributors to the Seattle area Korean society and, having experienced hardships themselves, be willing to give back to the Korean community and help many other people with the gospel. Korean school, this is a part of K School, is offered Saturdays for 2 hours.

Example of teaching option for K School and Afterschool:

- 2-3 times a week (or weekend)
- 4:00pm-6:00pm (2 hours)
- 1 or 2 times a week or a couple weeks each month by internet.

Mission Strategy Federal Way (South King county)

- <u>Personal mailing to household</u>: according to our research, Holy Trinity church next to Federal Way, WA, has the largest concentration of Korean people in the state and ranks number 5 in population or 5.4% out of 89,306 people. So, we made an attempt at mailing an informational post card about KLC. We will try to get the area Korean addresses to print in Korean, and attempt to send this spring for Easter, and later for church celebrations.

Project mission in Korea

- Training lay leader

For the past few years, I have been teaching Catechism and Bible Information Classes to lay leaders in Korea via the internet (Skype). So far, it is my feeling, that this teaching has not been accepted as vital. I expect, this is due to the time difference and other reasons. So I have prayed for ways to encourage the Korean lay leaders, even if it means to see them face-to-face, if possible. A trip to Korea is not an easy thing, so far.

However, last year I visited Korea for about two weeks, as my mother-in- law is ill and it also allowed me to visit the lay leaders I have been teaching. I confirmed that there are lay leaders who dream about being an evangelist, an elder, and /or a pastor in Korea.

Therefore, the Korean Lutheran Church has been planning to provide Bible training and to share the gospel through internet means for those lay leaders and their children living in Korea. With a view toward the future, eventually this program would be able to share the gospel to any Koreans in Korea and spread into China. This training started the first week of January 2016 in officially, through internet class solution what name is 'clickmeeting' this solution is live study to face to face, upload any study materials, recoding, and reviewing lessons when they need.

In last two years 2015-2016, <u>Kyung Ho Kim</u> finished all of CAP courses. However, he is still studying in detail about catechism and Bible information class 1-2 hours a week though 'clickmeeting' to teach kids and family members. Please refer to pics and sample videos.

He would be start tent ministry from this year(2017)sometimes on his home in Korea after preparing few months. The ultimate objective of this project is establish WELS Church (and school) in Korea before I retire.

Virtual Online School

K School of Virtual Online Class for In Korea and everywhere

KLC is running a 'Korean School'. This school is supported by the Korea Board of Education and is available for enrollment through the WA State Board of Education.

The school is accredited by a regional accreditation agency (www.advanc-ed.org).

So we plan to expand the school to Korea by using this local program here via the internet and/or an afterschool program for children of the CAP course trainer and lay members and around their neighbors' children who are <u>in public school</u>, but it is still pending due to lack of teachers.

Further, we plan bilingual classes to their children and kids who hardly understand English and we will be using the advantages through the accredited program in Washington State. Mostly, the subjects would include: Bible studies, Catechism, writing, reading, and history, since the children learn other subjects in Korea's public schools.

I would be teaching Bible history and Catechism but would need certified teachers for other subjects, i.e., language arts, (writing, reading, spelling) history, etc. Also, K school has teachers and substitute teachers who can teach all subjects, except Bible/Catechism, in a bilingual format. Some of them are

certified in Korea for a Korean teacher, and majored in education in college. They are serving in K school Korean classes. This program can begin as soon as we are ready and have the communication tools in place via our internet system.

The children who at any levels would want to study more in the US, would be transferred to Holy Trinity and one of the WELS schools. (For reference, I assisted over 75 children with enrollment and transferring to HTLS/ELHS and other WELS schools, so far.)

Through these classes the children will become Christ-centered in their faith by and through the true gospel. We believe that children should become great gospel contributors to their community and to other souls in Korea. and this class also has a plan to open to anybody who wants to learn the true gospel with the Virtual Online Class program who lives everywhere, as soon as we are ready in the future.)

Example of teaching option and needs:

- E Book, paper books and study materials.
- 3 days a week, week days or Fri-Sun (weekends) *Sunday class is flexible
- 11:00 pm- 1:00 am, 2 hours a day (K 4:00 pm 6:00 pm)
- VBS / Camp 4 Star in Summer / WELS international Camp in US (if possible)
 - Summer and winter VBS Camp in Korea (if possible)
- Teacher wage: \$25-\$30/Hour (45 minutes) x 2 pay teachers and few volunteer teachers.

- -This is our last scheduled month to receive operating mission subsidy. There is a sense of gratitude among the congregation for all the support received and excitement for the future self-supporting ministry (Lord willing).
- -Preschool 2018/19 We are full for next year! The waiting list has begun growing. We see an opportunity to expand but we also need to finance the expansion. The estimated cost of bringing our portable to comparable level of current classroom is \$75,000 (septic tank install included). The leadership remains hopeful that this goal is attainable through special donations or a capital campaign after the congregation is off mission subsidy.
- -Back to the Word of Christ and the Body of Christ! The church leadership went through ministry evaluation and strategic planning over the past 9 months. In our evaluation, we feel it is essential we refocus our efforts to direct our members to Bible study and to

each other. We admittedly have drifted from the "why?" to the "how?" and "what?" of the mission. One evaluator asked, "Are we just "doing" church?" The board wrestled with the following questions: How do we stay focused on the mission? How do we engage new members to own the mission? How do we grow (should the Lord bless us with growth) and keep our sense of community that we enjoyed as a smaller congregation? These are just a few of the questions we wrestled with. We recently presented to the congregation an extensive small group ministry plan. We hope to launch in the fall. We pray time in the Word of Christ and time with the Body of Christ will refocus and reenergize our congregation.

The fire we suffered on October 15, 2017, has tested the quality of the work God has allowed us to carry out for three decades in the Lacey, Washington area. The work goes on with the major difficulty that we no longer have a church building to meet in. When the fire happened we had started an emphasis on gathering special gifts to allow us to pursue a vision of Family Ministry Outreach. We prayed that we could have enough support to lift off with early childhood education and after school care to meet the needs of our community with gospel-centered programs. We pray that we may still begin these programs but the fire has delayed our progress.

We remain grateful for the prayers and support of our brothers and sisters in the Pacific Northwest. We give thanks for prayers and support from many other parts of the WELS.

Currently we have the remnant of a building standing on our church property. Insurance has dictated that we explore the feasibility of rebuilding the structure by keeping some of the damaged walls. We await the evaluation of an engineer's report that will determine the cost to rebuild leading to a final settlement. Then we can make plans based on either a rebuild and remodel or new construction. We patiently wait for that outcome.

In the meantime we continue with as much of our normal gospel ministry that we can accomplish. We meet for Bible class, Sunday School and worship at a public school near our church property. We hold meetings and Bible classes during the week at member homes, coffee shops, a local Legion Hall, and other places we rent. Our group has grown closer through the tribulations. Attendance from members has increased but visits from newcomers have decreased.

In the Lord's good time we will hold a celebration and dedication of the church building and move forward under his blessed guidance.

At ROCK, we share a good meal provided by some of our men, we talk, we laugh, we study, we share, we get to know one another better, and we have fun. All in 2 hours time! (11 a.m. to 1 p.m.) We meet once a month, usually on the second Saturday of the month.

At St. Paul's we've had the privilege of baptizing a number of folks recently. Just this year we have already baptized 4 children and 3 adults (including a Chinese student who began attending our congregation 3 years ago, and who graduated from Evergreen Lutheran High School this year). In the next few weeks we expect to baptize several more children. Most are actually not our members, but they recognize the blessing of this Sacrament and come to us to receive it. How awesome! Praise God!

God is indeed gracious, and Saint Paul Lutheran Church continues to rejoice in Him and his goodness to our congregation.
